

From General Officer Commanding, South Africa, to War Office.

(No. 6296.)

21st August, 1915, 4.15 p.m.

My No. 6293. Since despatch thereof Defence intimates that he can send 2,000 complete rounds as a matter of urgency, but cannot guarantee fuses being reliable as their Marks are 65, 63 and 60. Also, he says that in view of the possibility of their requiring them later on in British East Africa, it could only be a temporary loan and on condition that arrangements will be made with the War Office by British East African command to replace them as soon as possible at Cape Town.

From War Office to Major General Tighe.

Your letter of 19th July. The searchlights to which you refer are not service articles and it is not possible to procure them except after much delay. We are sending some which are practically identical, and they can be adapted for mule transport.

23rd August, 1915, 5.15 p.m.

It has been suggested by the Belgian Government that a Naval demonstration with a feint of landing troops on the coast of German East Africa might relieve the pressure near Lake Tanganyika. It is expected that the Naval flotilla will have arrived at Tanganyika at the end of September. Will you please consult with the Admiral as to the possibility of this suggestion being carried out with the forces at your disposal about that time.

From General Smuts to War Office.

(No. D. 1578.)

26th August, 1915.

Before the final arrangements are made for the shipment of all our aeroplanes, equipment and aviation personnel from Cape Town to England should like to know whether you consider these cannot perhaps be more usefully employed in East Africa either on British East African or North Eastern Rhodesian border of German territory. Our officers should have reached England last week but they could be sent back. Please understand that this is merely a suggestion and that aeroplanes, equipment and personal are entirely at your disposal for any service you may think most desirable.

In reference to your No. 6296 of 21st. Will you please despatch to General Tige at Nairobi, 3,000 complete rounds 15-pr. B.L. gun ammunition, and inform him and his office of the despatch? We will make arrangements for early replacement.

From Major-General Tige to War Office.

27th August, 1915.

In reference to your telegram No. 330 of 25th of 25th August. Anything like an effect on the operations in the River East Africa Coast is not possible with the forces at present available. A landing immediately followed by a re-embarkation would probably be reported to the Germans as a British reverse. I am in correspondence with the Admiralty as regards making a Naval demonstration with warships and transports. To make a show of strength, I can spare a few hundred second line troops.

From War Office to General Smuts, President.

27th August, 1915, 4.50 p.m.

In reference to your No. D. 1578 of 22nd August. We prefer to keep to the original arrangement after considering all the circumstances. If necessary the requirements of British East Africa will be supplied otherwise.

28th August, 1915.

Your telegram of 19th August, No. M. 137, will be grateful for Pickard motor lorries, 100 R.E.O. cars, 100 Hupmobiles, 30 sufficient spaces to maintain six months, with addition of 6 lathe, 6 sensitive drilling machines with drills, assorted sizes; 24 vessels, 6 stocks and dies complete, 300 spanners, assorted sizes, 200 files, 6 powerful blow lamps, 6 blowers, as well as accessories, 24 powerful garage jacks. All-motor Laburnum Parsons busses, but an odd will be needed unless I have trained drivers at scale of three men for two buses. During this seven months for five cars.

I am to give you the names of Lieutenant Hamilton and Lieutenant Boyce, range towers, 2 gunners, 8 assistants, 2 plotters, 1 Battery master and 1 Assistant Royal Gunner, Artillery, and those of the rest.

28th August, 1915, 4 p.m.

Can you supply 1,000 rifle grenades, referring to F.O.C.C. unofficial letter to Major South Ordinance, East Afr. dated 20 July, for details if required. No. 1 C.E.W. 1908 drawings preferred, from which have brush or other patterns or patches provided that all are of same pattern.

Can you supply 1,000 rifle grenades as supplied to Russia from America agents Bayliss, 19 New Bond Street, E.C., telegraphic address, Messrs. and Sons. Also Novitskiy, capable for long range trench bombardment from agents, Willey, Co., Salisbury House, London Wall, telegraphic address, Watchless. Also French pattern of projected grenade Explosor, A, and Commander Hay's spokot howitzer at least one of each all patterns, prefer 20 calibres with no bolts for howitzer. Also 200 rockets, war time pounds, believed available Whall Island. Also 56 tissue respirators as patterns by way of precaution.

Will you please also forward details of means of repelling gas if used by the enemy including sprayers, chemicals, &c.
