Hostile patrol activity has increased during the current month, chiefly owing to the progress of the railway, now 5 miles from Maktau. Our patrols have more than held their own. I anticipate possibility of attacks on Maktau or Mzima; adequate measures have been taken against them. There have been several attempts on the railway; only two of them have been partially successful and the damage is slight. Loyal North Lancashires have only 40 per cent. fit, principally on account of lever at Karungu, from which place white troops are now excluded.

The Turkhana expedition has concluded very successfully in spite of the great

natural difficulties. Will send full particulars at the end of the month.

The Bukoba expedition sails Kisumu on the 20th. The Naval Commander in Chief will attack the "Königsberg" at the same time, making a simultaneous feint landing at Dar-es-Salsam, for which I supply troops (two groups underipherable) on transports. In British East Africa there is a considerable number of Boers; mostly loyal, but with a doubtful section. One of the latter, usined Wessels, until recently serving as captain in losal force, had resigned with the intention of proceeding to South Africa. His loyalty has recently been under suspicion. An agent provocateur was therefore employed and Wessels accepted a document of military importance, undertaking to convey it to the meny. The interview was partially overheard by another agent Wessels was arrested after the lapse of 30 hours. He had burnt the document but kept notes of the contents. He stated he was about to bring the matter to my to fice. The Juffge Advocate-General considers that the case although weak, unjut result in conviction under martial law, but the prisoner must be allowed counsel. It is most important that the details of my secret service should not leak out, and the effect of

the trial on doubtful Boers might be harmful. I am convinced that the best course is deportation of Wessels, and I suggest South Africa, where he could be interned with robel Boers and thus be prevented from communicating with British East Africa, which is most desirable. If this can be arranged, please telegraph.
