My dear Wiseman,

I have been in consultation with Sir Hoveton Heward, and we suggest that Mr. Scott Anderson should be asked to furnish a series of representative samples of the deposit together with:

- (a) A map showing the position of the deposit, in order that an opinion may be formed as to the accessibility of the deposit in relation to the question of transport.
- (b) Information as to climate and as to available supplies of water, fuel and labour.
- (c) General geological data relating to the district, and specific information as to the geological horizon from which the samples have been taken.
- (d) Such particulars as he may be able to give indicating the area and thickness of the deposit, the depth to which it may extend, and the method of mining the shale which would have to be adopted.
