Sir,

Goods from Hamburg intended for Mombasa, B.E.A. now ex. S.M.
"Adolph Woermann" at Rotterdam.

As an old established merchant firm of this city with branches at Mombasa and Zanzibar, B.E.A., we find ourselves in a difficulty to decide in what way we should act in order to comply with the requirements of our Government in this matter, following which we take the liberty to lay before you, together with the letter of P.A. Voigt & Co., dated 26th October, and which we enclose for your information together with a list of the shipments referred to, and one copy of a Bill of Lading, which represents the lot.

We might explain that for many years past we have bought in Germany through a Hamburg firm, a variety of cheap goods suitable for the Mombasa market, but not permissible in this country at so low a C.I.F. cost. These goods were shipped from Hamburg by the D.G.A. Line steamers, direct to B.E.A., and never touched the English shore. One such cargo left Hamburg about 28th July, 1914 by the s.s. "Adolph Woermann," and the Bill came through to us just at the time when war was declared. These Bills of Lading are still in our possession, although it was not permissible for us to pay for same on receipt according to our usual custom. Simultaneously we found this steamer put in at Rotterdam and has been there all through the war period until now.

It will be noticed that it is proposed to store the goods in Rotterdam for our account, subject to a considerable array of charges, not only on carriage of the Bills of Lading, but also


