- Kijabe en route for England having with him a Colobus monkey, 2 leopard skins 10 wild cat skins, 1 rock rabbit skin, 3 blown ostrich egg shells and some ostrich feathers.
- (2) On the arrival of his train at Mombasa he was met by a Gosnese Customs Officer (no white man being present) who asked him if he had anything to declare. He at once mid "yes, a Colobus monkey skin being aware that he must pay on this but not considering that he was hable for duty on the other things above mentioned. He produced to the Comese Officer the box containing the colobus nonkey sing thirds and will the other articles and the Officer then said that he was attempting to want duty on the parious articles and took him hofore to be to the thief of Custom.
- (3) Gur Tiles we considerably suboyed and sointed out to Mr bajor that his firm held a licence fer selling catrich feathers and offered to pay for a telegram to the Distance Countinformer of Asyania to prote this as there appeared to be me syldence at licebean that this was so (although from our instructions it would appear the this information should be available there) but his offer was refused

(4) He was accordingly taken before Mr Shendon a Megistrate sitting as Mombasa to whom the facts were explained by our Client. The magistrate expressed his intention of remanding the case but as the dalay which would be occasioned by that procedure would have resulted in our Client losing the bost to England he explained that rather than have the case adjourned he would plead guilty to the charge and pay the fine.

he leopard skins and a skins etc are only vermin and so far as the ostrick feathers etc are concerned we understand that as our lients firm were licensees for selling ostrich feathers a permit could have been obtained at Tawasha if our Client had known it was necessary.

Even after the skins which were returned to our Client had been sended over to him and sealed he was again arrested and further his fox was taken away from the Customs shed without his instructions so had our Client complains that in every respect the whole matter was leastly conducted and he was very badly treated.

From the instructions our Client gives us we consider that the whole matter is unnestionably one for encuiry and for redress and quite apart from the fact that he has been treated badly he considers it his duty to his fellow Colonians to state the facts so he far as possible what as considers such high handed improper and loose procedure may be avoided in the future.

We may mention that our Client was a Captain in the sallway Honser Regiment which served in the Roer war and was subsequently a J.P. for Johannesburg and his partner Mr Clements is the present time a J.P. in Fritish Fast Africa.
