I would inform him that in view of it
the Somali must remain in Ceylon for
the present. (To whom he can be of service
if he helps them shut up, & Ceylon are really
to any possible course.)

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Confidential despatch dated the 3rd of November and to inform you that the General Officer Commanding is of opinion that it would be most undesirable to permit any of the Somali Scouts now detained in Ceylon to return to this Protectorate during the continuance of hostilities.

2. In view of this expression of opinion on the part of Major General Tighe I am afraid that these Somalis must remain in Ceylon. It is very satisfactory to hear that their conduct there has been so good.
