Sends list of deficiencies to which the  
Medical Storekeeper at Bombay refers to  
make good. Submit report and ask that  
matter be taken up with the Govt. of India.

Copy of despatch sent to S. C. Remond  
then that in a letter No 10866 of 8 Dec  
he had occasion to draw attention  
to the case of medical stores  
supplied to Zanzibar to the deficiencies  
and discrepancies as between the  
stores stated to have been supplied  
and the stores actually received.

Concern is the Govt's view that  
the fact that the shipping Agents  
gave a receipt for the stores cannot  
be held to absolve the Admin  
authorities from responsibility for  
deficiencies in their contents & ask  
that they will press the Govt. of India  
to refund the excess charge.



I have the honour to forward a list of deficiencies in the goods received from the Government Medical Store, Bombay, in response to our indent Noe. 38 and 45 of 1914.

2. The estimate of deficiencies was made by a comparison of the actual amounts and numbers invoiced and those received.

3. The unpacking and checking of the items was personally supervised by the Medical Storekeeper Nairobi.

4. The cases as received were reported as having been delivered intact in Nairobi and none bore evidence of having been tampered with en route.

5. The Medical Storekeeper to Government, Bombay, has refused to refund the value of the shortage

shortage on the ground that he holds a receipt from the Protectorate Agents, Messrs Mackinnon, Mackenzie & Company. This receipt however can only refer to the number of packages and not to their contents, as the packages were never opened between the Bombay Store and the Nairobi Store, and, as I have stated, were delivered intact.

6. I have therefore the honour to request that the matter may be taken up with the Government of India.
