

Sir,

With reference to paragraph 4 of my Confidential despatch No. 42 of the 5th instant, in which I stated that the Director of Public Works put the increase in the Nairobi Electric Power and Lighting Company's business due to the war at 31%. I have the honour to inform you that on further and more exhaustive enquiry Mr. McGregor has estimates the additional load due exclusively to war conditions at 75 Kilowatts over a normal peacetime load of 240 Kilowatts the increase being therefore 31%.

As regards lamps, the number previous to the war was 12,202; it is now 8,450 an increase of 24%, of which military lamps numbering 1,957, account for just under 22%.

RE:

South of Trooper

Local residents in this
district are requested that they
be allowed to know the name or rank
or the name of a person to whom they desire
notification of any casualty in Trooper
by taking advantage of the system adopted by
selecting receiving the address of his son
or heir.

It is requested that the
name of the son or heir
should not be sent direct
to the next of kin. A case in point has recently
arisen in which an officer particularly requested
that

that the fact that he was ill should not be communicated to his next-of-kin who was herself in indifferent health.

4. I admit that it is desirable that you should be placed in a position to inform the next-of-kin, when they reside in England, of a casualty, but I fear that it would be most difficult to obtain amended particulars from those who have already enlisted here and I therefore propose to take no action with regard to them unless you instruct me to do so. I have however requested the military authorities to obtain such particulars from any who may join the forces in the future and I will, when informing you of a casualty, state whether it is undesirable for the next-of-kin to be officially informed by you.
