RESUME OF WAR DIARY.

For period 15th to 21st April (inclusive).

Note. During period covered by last week's Résumé, the 2nd Division (less the 3rd S.A.I. Brigade), after the capture of Lelkissale, continued their advance South, the 2nd S.A.H. arriving at Tarangerie on the 9th, capturing 1 German and 13 askaris. On the 11th a patrol met and killed 8 askaris, and on the 13th the Force occupied Ufioeme, taking 30 prisoners, some wounded, and stores, with loss to us of one killed and one wounded. Later the advance was continued, with Kondoa Irangi as its objective. The captures referred to above were reported in last week's Résumé.

15th April. The Division reports has decided to rest his animals at Mwanga until the 17th evening and then push forward on to Kondoa Irangi.

Heavy rains falling generally. Weru Weru bridge down.

16th April. Lake Detachment reports Belgian concentration will be completed 21st April, weather permitting, otherwise not before the 25th inst.

Secretary of State for the Colonies has approved of the raising of three additional battalions of K.A.R.

General heavy rains reported everywhere. Kahe is practically a swamp, the Ruwu River has flooded its banks, the river at Arma Tchini is impeneable,

and the Defu has risen to bridge level, making the surrounding country a swamp.

17th April. Lake Detachment reports a patrol captured Chobiyas, son of Nyema. Eight hostile natives killed.

General rains still falling, though not so heavily as at the beginning of the week.

18th April. The railway has reached a point four miles from the Tanga-Moshi line.

Rains abating somewhat.

The Intelligence Section reports that the Pangani River is stated to be clear of the enemy as far South as Marago Minanani.

19th April. 2nd S.A.I. Brigade reports itself to be seven miles East of Arusha.

The Intelligence Section report that enemy's main force is still at Lembeni.

20th April. Lake Detachment reports that the Belgians occupied Kwidjwi, island on Lake Kivu.

Heavy rains reported at Mbuyuni.

21st April. A despatch from the 2nd Division received to-day states that our mounted troops came in touch with the enemy four miles North of Kendea Irangi on the 17th, and that the latter's right flank has been driven back. Heavy rains are impeding our progress.

Intelligence Section reports that a deserter from Lembeni states the garrison at that place to have been considerably reduced during the last week.
