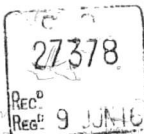

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Circular (9) despatch dated the 15th of December last respecting the necessity of making provision to safeguard the pension rights of officers holding permanent Colonial appointments who have been permitted to undertake naval or military duties during the present war.

2. No legislation with regard to pensions exists in this Protectorate and European officers holding permanent and pensionable appointments in this Protectorate are subject to the regulations originally issued by the Foreign Office on the 25th of April 1906,

the 4th edition of which (African No. 839) was transmitted to me in your predecessor's despatch No. 1024 of the 29th of November, 1913. These Regulations are based on the Superannuation Acts 1859 and 1876, and if it is considered necessary to frame permanent additional regulations in accordance with Mr. Harcourt's Circular despatch of the 31st of August, 1914, and your Circular despatch now under reply, I would suggest that a new edition of the Regulations should be issued embodying the rulings given.

3. I take this opportunity of enquiring whether the rulings under discussion apply also to Non-European officials as, if so, an amendment to the Regulations issued by the Foreign Office on the 15th of May 1903 would appear to be necessary.
