PREGIS FOR WEEK ENDING

SATURDAY. MAY 13th. REG. 26 UN 16

I. THE DETAILS.

(i) It now appears that the telegram referred to in I(iii) of the precis for the week ending April 20th was from the Acting Provisobal Commissioner, Jubaland. He states in addition that he is of opinion that the assistance asked for by Abdurrahman Mursaal will not be given.

It is still not certain whether this telegram was sent by Mr. Power. If so, it appears to conflict with [[11] of the above-mentioned proces.

(11) On the 8th a telegram dated May 6th was received from the Acting Provincial Commissioner subaland, stating that the Italian Resident, Bardera, veports that the Aulihan kave fere the river and have all gone towards Wajheir.

GENERAL.

Wajheir, as soon as the re-occupation has taken place, should be satisfactory. He does not think it likely that the Mohamed Zubeir will join the Aulthan, but there is a possibility that, if our administration is relaxed, they might indulge in inter-tribal fights and raids on peaceful tribes and thus made it necessary for punitive measures to be taken against them as well as against the Auliban. With the re-occupation of Wajheir and the pressary of the Arab Rifles in Southern Jubaland this possibility should be largely eliminated.

The fact that no news of hostile indications on the part of any other section except the sulthan, though the rains have broken, is reassuring.
