I have the honour to refer to your telegram dated the 30th of August 1916 regarding the appointment of Mr. E. Adams as Liquidator of Enemy Firms.

2. I am informed that Mr. Adams entered into an agreement with the Crown Agents for the Colonies for a period not exceeding 12 months from the 21st of August 1916, and the question has recently been referred to me as to the source from which his salary and expenses should be paid. In the course of his duties he has found it necessary to visit both Uganda and Zanzibar and has incurred some expenses thereby but in each instance he has been able to collect assets of East African firms which have

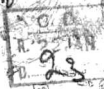
