- 8. The Cable Censor's Handbook records that this irm
 was reported on the 21st October 1915 as doing active trade
 with Germany and to be under German influence.
- 4. Klatzer and Co., are also described in "Who's who" as having sent a consignment of milk to Vienna French War Office 17-1-1916.
- 5. I submit that the consignment under notice should be released only under the strictest guarantee that no benefit will accrue to the enemy and I suggest that the present

transaction be used to enable to hear on Mesers, if so desired, to bring pressure to bear on Mesers, Klatzer and Co., in order to induce them to enter into such guarantees as will permit of their removal from the Black List.

A de say thing required of him the matter but stated out that the name of the irm of appear.

I suggested to his the absolute necessity for sking preliminary equippes before having any dealings with those resident in countries on the senemy territory and informed him of the risk ting to such transactions. Fr. Gill was apparently not full sware of the danger and promised to write to his lived Office on the matter and also to have no more dealings with the firm of Flatzer and Co.

with regard to the consignment under notice I told him that the goods would be detained pending the decision of the Chief of Customs to whom the facts would be reported.
