I have the honour to seek your authority to make arrangements to proceed to britain ensuch steamer as may be available during the month of February next. By tour of service will by that time have extended to some fifty-three months, and, as I anticipate that affairs in the Protectorate will have assumed more normal conditions, there would appear to be no special reason for further prolonging the period of my residence.

- 2. I have further to request your permission to make the journey via the Cape. I desire to take advantage of an invitation, kindly extended to make by General Botha, to spend a forthight in the Union and travel through the country.
