 I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Confidential despatch, dated the 6th of October, relating to the amount of the house allowance granted to Office Superintendents.

2. I regret that you are unable at present to approve my proposal to increase the allowance to £60 per annum. I do not however think that any undesirable precedent would be created thereby, as an Office Superintendent may be expected to possess longer service than other officers holding second class appointments, and he is moreover a Government servant of proved capacity who should be encouraged to marry and settle down in a house of his own.

3. I see no reason why the recognition of these facts should involve the grant of a similar concession to clerks and other officers holding positions of secondary importance and I hope that you will therefore be able to reconsider your decision.

4. I should add that junior officers can
