SIR,

*Very busy*

With reference to your despatch  
dated 2nd instant or the 14th of October on the  
subject of the Anglo-Portuguese Commercial  
Treaty Act 1914, I have the honour to inform  
you that unless adherence to the Anglo-  
Portuguese Commercial Treaty of 1914 is  
construed as a violation of the Portuguese  
Treaty of 1912 with Zanzibar so far as this  
protectorate is concerned or unless the  
application of that treaty to the Protectorate  
is definitely revoked I am of opinion that  
there is no object to be gained by the  
application of the Anglo-Portuguese  
Commercial Treaty of 1914 to this Protectorate.

2. If the application of the Treaty

of 1879 go, the Protectorate can be definitely revoked one step towards the removal of the disabilities imposed on the Protectorate by the Zanzibar Treaties will be made and I consider that there will then be no objection to adherence to the Anglo-Portuguese Commercial Treaty of 1914 although it is true that under the most favoured nation clauses in that Treaty the immediate effect of the adherence will not greatly mitigate the existing evils.
