In acknowledging the receipt of your letter of 19th instant, No. 3942/1914, giving cover to copy of a despatch from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate, we must express the regret with which we observe the tenour of some of the remarks made by Sir H. Conway Belfield with reference to our East African service, the efficiency of which is a matter which is engaging, and will continue to engage, our most careful consideration and earnest efforts.

As regards the charges for medical attendance recently instituted by us on all our South and East African passenger steamers, we beg to assure you that the decision to adopt this scale of charges was come to after the most careful consideration of this question in relation to our Medical Officers and to It has frequently been our passengers alike. brought to our notice that many passengers who had availed themselves during the voyage of the services of the ship's Surgeon were embarrassed by uncertainty as to the fees which they should properly pay, while, on the other hand, free medical attendance has often in the past led to the time and attention of our Doctors on board being unduly claimed by many passengers whose ailments were more or less trifling, if not The scale of charges now in force, 5/imaginary. per visit for First Class passengers and 2/6d for Second Class passengers, with free medical attendance for Third Glass passengers, cannot, we think, be said to be at all too high, and we may add that since the new arrangement came into force many of our Commanders have reported that passengers have again and again. voluntarily stated that they prefer the present system to the previous uncertainty as to what fees they should tender to the ship's Surgeon.

In this connection, we think the following extract from a letter received by us a few days ago from the British Medical Association will be of interest to you :-

[&]quot;The Association is informed that some Shipping Companies already sanction a fixed scale of charges with great advantage to their passenger "who now know exactly what they are expected to "pay for any medical services rendered to them, and with a distinct increase of comfort to the "Ship Surgeon, who is thereby placed in a proper "relationship with his patients. The Association has good reason to believe that the universal "adoption of such a system would do much to raise "the status of Ship Surgeons in the eyes both of "the public and of the profession, and would "obviate many exceedingly awkward situations. "which arise when the amount of the fee is left "to the discretion of the patient and subject to the Commander's approval. The present system in ract places all parties - the patient, the "Commander and the Doctor - in a position which fin the opinion of the Association is indefensible from either a business or a professional point

We have of course informed the Medical Association that a settled scale of fees for First and Second. Class passengers has already been adopted by us. Similar regulations have been in force on the steamers of many Companies, particularly in the trans-Atlantic trade, for several years past, and are now, we believe, being adopted by nearly all the important Passenger Lines.

As regards paragraph 3 of His Excellency's letter, under date Nairobi 6th January last, we gave instructions when the new system was inaugurated that, in the case of passengers whose passages had been booked under the conditions of the arrangement formerly existing, they should not be pressed for payment of medical fees, and we shall accordingly give instructions that anything paid on behalf of the holder of the return ticket referred to by His Excellency should be refunded by our Agents on application.
