as I understand it, the Belgians
have established at Kigali the
capital of Rwanda, an administrative
centre for the territories occupied by
their forces. Major Stevens is the
officer who is responsible for the
administration, and he derives his
authority from Mr. Tomson, the
military commander-in-chief, whose
headquarters are also at Kigali. The
military columns advancing into hostile
territory have nothing to do with
administrative arrangements, and, as

If this is the arrangement, it
is evident the returning would be
gained by having subordinate British
officials to accompany the various

establishment of a British adviser at

I have the honour to report that, upon receipt of your letter No. 40, confidential, (93574/16) of the 14th ultimo, I informed the Belgian Government that in view of the considerations advanced in Major's Government would not further press the proposal that the whole of the occupied territory in German East Africa should be placed under British administration. They accepted instead the suggestion put forward by Mr. Renan that a British senior Political Officer should be attached to the Headquarters of the Belgian Congo forces operating in East Africa for the purpose of advising upon administrative matters in occupied territory.

In order, however, to ensure uniformity, the principle of which has been accepted, the Belgian Government consider it essential that a senior Political Officer, acting in his advisory capacity,

should be permitted to accompany any important Belgian
detachments in East Africa.

According to the information at the disposal of
the Army Council the Headquarters of the Belgian forces
remained at Butembo in Belgian territory, whereas two
important columns, commanded respectively by Colonels
Molitor and Olsen, had penetrated considerable distances
into Rwanda, north, and east of Lake Kivu. The Council
desire that British Political Officers should be present
with both these columns and with any similar force that
might be detached, and I therefore expressed a hope that
on all such occasions the Belgian Government would
grant the necessary permission in order to attain the
object which His Majesty's Government attached much
importance.

I enclose copy of the despatch which I have received
from the Minister for Foreign Affairs. His Excellency
states that the Belgian Headquarters are now at Kigali,
the capital of Rwanda, and that they will follow the
line of communication between Injiri, with the invading

columns. In these circumstances the Belgian Government consider that the presence of a single British Superintendant Officer will be sufficient and that military orders will be issued from Headquarters and their execution superintended by the Officer in chief command of the Belgian expedition. The appointment of subordinate Officers to accompany each column would, it is maintained serve no useful purpose and would indeed lead to inconvenience, the Commanders not having to concern themselves with matters of administration.

Baron Beyens trusts that His Majesty's Government will agree in this view of the question.

Monsieur le Ministre,

J'ai l'honneur d'assurer à la réception de la dépêche que Votre Excellence a bien voulu m'indiquer le 23 mai au sujet de l'administration des territoires occupés par les forces belges dans la Colonie allemande de l'Est Africain.

J'ai appris avec une vive satisfaction que le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté britannique n'insistait plus pour que tous les territoires fussent placés sous l'administration anglaise, et acceptait la proposition d'attribuer au Quartier Général belge le fonctionnaire civil supérieur qui agirait à titre de conseil.

Dans la pensée que le Quartier Général belge restera à Rutschuru, le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté britannique demanda également que des fonctionnaires politiques anglais de second rang soient nommés à accompagner chacune des colonnes belges principales qui pénétreront dans l'Afrique Orientale.

J'ai l'honneur de faire connaître à Votre Excellence que cette nouvelle proposition est basée sur une erreur de fait. Le Quartier Général belge n'est pas à Rutschuru. Installé à Kibali jusqu'au 20 mai, il a été transféré à cette date à Kissavu et à Lubengera le 30 mai. Il est maintenant à Kigali, la Capitale du Ruanda. Le Sultan et la population, heureux d'être libérés

libérés du joug allemand, ont fait le meilleur accueil à nos troupes. Le Sultan a fait arborer le pavillon belge.

Quand il n'a été question de rompre le contact entre l'armée et le Quartier Général Belge ou laissant seulement un représentant belge? Tout au contraire, le Quartier Général n'a été mis toujours à proximité de la ligne de front afin de maintenir le contact avec toutes les colonnes d'Armistice.

Si le Quartier Général était resté sur le territoire belge, la proposition de lui attacher un haut fonctionnaire civil anglais qui agirait à titre de conseil en matière d'administration n'eût pu produire aucun effet utile; elle n'aurait pas été formulée par le Gouvernement du Roi.

Sans doute lorsque le Gouvernement de la majorité britannique sera en possession des informations ci-dessus, l'ensemble tranchera que la mesure sur laquelle les deux Gouvernements sont d'accord est suffisante pour l'obtention des fins qu'il a en vue et qu'il n'y a aucun motif pour aménager la proposition d'attribuer un fonctionnaire anglais à chaque unité belge déployant sur le territoire allemand.

Les questions relatives à l'occupation du pays occupé, c'est-à-dire du pays occupé entre la frontière et notre front définitivement consolidé, se traiteront entre le haut fonctionnaire anglais agissant à titre de conseil et le général français agissant à titre d'autorité suivant les instructions du gouvernement.

M. Tombour donnera les ordres relatifs à l'occupation

comme les autres et en surveillera l'execution de la mission le plus effectivement qu'il se trouvera dans le haut fonctionnaire conseil son plein pays occupé et que ses ordres s'annuleront en arrière du front.
