I feel that we have not a sufficiently detailed statement of the actual facts to enable us to judge finally in this matter, and I am not clear that under the local arrangements there is any practical difference between the requirements of duplicate invoices for firms with local connections and for firms without them.

But, in any case, it is clear that the requirement of the local Customs is designed in the interests of the Revenue; The Governor shews in the fifth paragraph of his despatch that it has now been regularly complied with and I should not further argue with Mr Worthington.

The consignors invoice is not likely to be less than the cost of the goods! and the presentation of suppliers' invoices seems rather in the nature of a protection for the local buyer than for the revenue.
