With reference to your letter of the 17th instant I enclose a copy of a letter sent to Mr. the Secretary of State by the interest carriers and the Royal Niger Company dated 1st April 1916 regarding the amount of £1,000,000 to be paid from the Royal Niger Company's account in the Colonial Office, from which sum £100,000 was to be paid to the Royal Niger Company and £900,000 to the Royal Niger Company's account in the Bank of Central Africa.

As at the time of the transfer of the Royal Niger Company to the Bank of Central Africa, the Royal Niger Company will ultimately have to be divided between the various African Protectorates and this Department in view of the fact that the local common charges account is ultimately to be split up it is proposed to put forward a claim against the Native Estates for interest on their share of this expenditure, and I am to suggest that, in the circumstances, the whole question of the payment
