From: Local Group in Sumatra, Chief of the Imperial General Staff

The Belgian column of about 2,500 men, Colonel Molitor in command, is marching from Kawangi to Rigali, has reached Batanjata and Lake Manasa, and their marching is much hampered by rains, full rivers and the absence of roads. General Vandeventer reports that the enemy, after having fallen back a considerable distance from Komsiring towards the central railway on the roads to Perak and Dodinga, has been reinforced and has retreated to within 6 miles of Komsiring. The strength of the enemy probably does not exceed 2,000 and General Vandeventer is quite able to deal with them. The aeroplane which proceeded on a reconnaissance along the Perak Valley some 10 days ago and failed to return, has not been heard of and the possibility of landing had been rejected in the Manasa country and that pilot and observer's return has now been abandoned. The rains are somewhat abating in the Alau and Anasha area, and the health of the troops is improving.
