Sir.

I am in receipt of your letter of the 1°th June. No.20638/14. with Statistics of the exports of cotton from East Africa and Ugands. for the quarter epded 31st March 1914.

I notice that the Fast A lean Cotton is valued at 10d per 1b. and the Uganda Cotton at 9 d. per 1b. I see in our letter of the 4th October we gave 8d to 10d. as the value of the East African Cotton, and on the 11th March 7 d to 9d..

I think however, you will agree that 10d per 1b.is rather too high a price on which to value the exports for the quarter ended 31st March. The Uganda cotton was valued at 6 d - 9 d. per 1b. on the 4th October, and in our letter of the 11th March it was given as 6 to 7 d. per 1b. but the exports are all valued at 9 d per 1b. which is considerably above their actual value.

Perhaps in future it would be better if we gave an average value rather than the highest and lowest prices, for the only cotton from Uganda, which fetched 9 d per 1b. was some which was sown

from selected seed under Government supervision.
