CAMEL TRYPANOSOMIASIS INVESTIGATION EMPLOYMENT OF MISS ROBERTSON

Sir.

The Tropical Diseases Committee of the Royal Society have had under their consideration a proposal, originating some time ago in a suggestion of methe Colonial Office, that the services of Miss Robertson, who has lately returned from her term of service for the investigation into trypanosomiasis in Uganda, should be utilised in the Soudan to investigate the problems of camel trypanosomiasis. This disease is responsible for serious losses among the camels, horses and cattle in Egypt, the Soudan and parts of British East Africa. A thorough investigation which might afford a basis for measures of control and prevention is consequently a matter of considerable economic importance.

The Committee of the Royal Society desire to recommend this proposal to the favourable consideration of the Secretary of State and suggest that, if he sees his way to commissioning Miss Robertson to proceed to Khartoum for the purpose mentioned, the Royal Society should supervise the enquiry, and that Miss Robertson should report to the Society from time to time.

The Committee discussed a rough estimate of the

probable cost of the investigation and are addised that 4 it would not exceed 2000 per annum for two years, which they consider the least time that should be devoted to it. As already stated, the enquiry is one which concerns not only the Soudan but also East Africa, and to some extent Uganda also, and they hope that this circumstance will render it possible for the Colonial Office to collect the funds necessary to defray the cost. As a contribution towards these funds the Royal Society would propose, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, to transfer the sum of £300 out of a balance remaining in their hands from the gr t made by the Colonial Office towards the expenses of therapeutical experiments in relation to trypanosomiasis.

In the event of the proposal under reference meeting with the approval of the Secretary of State, I am to ask that enquiries may be instituted as to the facilities for transport not only upon but outside the railway and steamboat routes, that the Soudan Government would be prepared to afford to Miss Robertson; and further to ask for an assurance that authority would be given to her to travel about the country so far as might be required for the purposes of the enquiry.

The Committee are impressed with the importance of a first-hand study in the field of the conditions producing the disease in the local endemic centres. In pursuance of this principle Miss Robertson has a programme of localities to be visited suggested by Dr. Balfour, lately Director of the Khartoum Research Laboratories; but she would be quite prepared to place

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herself in the hands of the local authorities in selecting the particular centres best adapted by the lift of facilities of access to the sources of infection for pursuing the enquiry.

The approximate estimate above ment oned was based upon the assumption that Miss Robertson would receive the same scale of pay and allowances as she had in Uganda during her recent term of service.
