PARAPHRASED TRANSLATION: From the officer administering the Government of the East African Protectorate to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

(Received Colonial Office 1.8 p.m. 4th June 1917.)

June 26th. I am afraid that shortages of shipping will very seriously affect local export industries such as the coffee and sisal unless the prospect of shipment is reasonable, local banks are unwilling to make advances against produce, unless financial assistance is provided many valuable plantations will probably go ruined.

... We legislated until the recent session a tax -ation recommending that the local Government should make advances at the rate of £25 per cwt on an average annual coffee actually stored with Government; such advances to bear interest at the rate of 8 per cent. which is the local bank rate. Amount required for one year would be £10,000. Consider that proposal financially feasible. Coffee is rather special, sees owing to comparatively large number of individuals affected. Will you approve such advances against coffee?

... Respecting other export industries no reliable figures are yet available but it is improbable that Protectors could finance them to any great extent and I should therefore be glad to know whether there is any hope of assistance from Imperial Government.

... Submit to you that it is a matter of Imperial importance that Industries in British colonies should be sustained in order to be on the cessation of hostilities able to compete with other countries.
