THE DISEASES OF ANIMALS ORDINANCE, 1906.

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The purpose of the above Bill is to increase the compensation payable for the destruction of cattle under the powers conferred by the Diseases of Animals Ordinance, 1906. Owing to the introduction of European breeds and of the increased demand for native stock the increase in the value of cattle has been so great that in many cases the compensation provided by the Diseases of Animals Ordinance, 1906, i.e. Rs.50/- in the case of an animal affected with disease and Rs.100/- in the case of an animal suspected to be so affected, is entirely insufficient to afford reasonable compensation. The above amounts have by the provisions of the Bill been increased to Rs.150/- and Rs.300/- respectively.

2. The Bill may in my opinion properly be assented to without prior reference to the Secretary of State.

3. A comparative table is attached hereto.


