Lingga Area. Jianga Plain is again sheet of water owing to all rivers being in flood.

Tindzi Area. 1/2nd K.A.R. engaged large party enemy at Yangwani and inflicted heavy casualties.

Elsewhere no change.

27th April. General. German prisoners of war at Tanga giving trouble, and arrangements made to strengthen garrison at that place.

Otherwise nothing to report.

28th April. 1st Divisional. Numerous patrol encounters reported Byssaland Force. Hawthorn's Column has occupied Tindzi's position at Likuju and reports road towards Tivale clear for 7 miles.

Owing to move of enemy party into Portuguese territory, and their occupation of Nzembe, General Northey moves 5th S.A.I. to Fort Johnston.

Elsewhere nothing to report.

29th April. Byssaland Force. Rufiji River at Kibambawe at highest level this season, being some 14 feet above dry season level.

Elsewhere no change.

30th April. General. Major Montgomerie reports that he evacuated Kitunda Mission on 26th and fell back towards Sikonge, Wintgens advanced troops reaching Kitunda on the same day. Major Hoy with 400 Cape Corps concentrated at Kiromo N.E. of Kitunda.

Enemy sent in under flag of truce offering to surrender
Mpanganya Hospital on account of lack of supplies
 Elsewhere no change.

21st April. Wesland Force. Murray on 19th was at Kijanja
 (T.M.U.L.S.C.) and Wintgens was reported to have moved back
 from Shaula

Elsewhere no change.

22nd April. Wesland Force. Troke's position at Tukulu again
 bombed from an aeroplane

Elsewhere nothing to report.

23rd April. 1st Division. Enemy sent in under flag of truce
 wishing to surrender post at Kipendamayo, it being completely
 cut off by floods.

Lindi Area. 1/2nd K.A.R. surprised enemy camp near
 Yangwani (M.14.A.), inflicted casualties on enemy, and
 captured his camp with quantity of ammunition and material.

General. General Hoskins and staff returned to
 Darressalaam from Udziji.

24th April. 1st Division. Patrol encounters reported, and
 party 3rd Kashmiris attacked on Kilwa-Lindi road near Kilwa,
 when enemy were driven off, suffering casualties.
 Elsewhere no change.

25th April. Lindi Area. Saudi was attacked by enemy on 24th who
 was driven off, suffering severe losses.

Elsewhere nothing to report.

26th April. Nigerian Brigade. The enemy having withdrawn from
 Ngembe, and owing to the difficulty of supplies on Mikese-
 Rufiji line, it was decided to withdraw the 1st Nigerian
 Regiment to the Central Railway.

SUMMARY OF WAR DIARY for period 16th to 30th April 1917.

16th April. Nigerian Brigade. River falling and supplies now able to cross.

Myasaland Force. Murray left Iwungu on 14th having been delayed by non-arrival of supplies. Wintgens left Pamei (A.M.C.G. 9.4.) on 11th making for Kitunda Mission

General. Orders were issued for formation of flying column to be ready proceed Kitunda to reinforce Montgomerie at that place if necessary.

Elsewhere no change.

17th April. General. Orders issued for Mobile Column to move from Morogoro to Itigi.

A central school for instruction in Machine Gun and Stokes Mortars was opened at Morogoro.

Otherwise no change.

18th April. Myasaland Force. Aeroplane bombed Lincke's position near Jikuju on 16th.

Murray, in pursuit of Wintgens, has reached point 15 miles north of Iwungu.

19th April. 1st Division. A force composed of 40th Pathans and 200 rifles 2/2nd K.A.R., Lewis Gun Detachment, and 2 Gold Coast Regiment Mountain Guns, attacked enemy position near Rumbo. The enemy were in stronger force than anticipated, and threatening to envelop both flanks our force was compelled to withdraw. The 40th Pathans lost heavily, and heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy.

Elsewhere nothing to report.

20th April. 1st Division. Report all quiet.
