From the North the Garren are threatened by an invasion of the Dagodia. Mr. Kitterwaster is given to understand that the tribe issuery manerous and thinks that this problem is possibly the largest that has yet faced us as regards Somali immigration. He believes however that it can be stopped by the establishment of strong military posts at frequent intervals along the Daua river which forms a natural boundary and for a good part of the year is not fordable. Three posts would be sufficient and the area to be watched is from Malka Bissika (FE) to Dolo (XIII-E).

## PHECIS FOR THE PERIOD APRIL 28th-MAY 20th.

It The Datails. Three letters from Mr.Kittermaster deted Wajheir April 16th arrived here on May 25th. They give further details on the attack by the Dagodia on the Garren at Ramo referred to in Precis for the period ended March 14th [f]. Most sections of the tribe seem to have joined in the raid, their killed being estimated at between 30-40 shile the numbers of wounded were probably great. On the alarm the parren fled in all directions into the bush leaving the brunt of the attack to be home by Mr.Glenday, who had with him Dr. Chall and some 30 Northern Frontier District Constabulary, and Lieuterant Mortimer with 25 rank and file of the 3rd King's African Rifles and a Maxim. Practically no stock was parried off.

The presence of two Marchan Rer Hazaun unong the raiders has been proved, and it was well known in the Marchan country that the attack was to take place. In fact, Mr. Glanday has heard that Ahaned Affan, headman of the Rer Hazaun, had all his men ready to make an attack on the Garren could people as soon as the Dagodis should prove successful.

The Marchen and in particular the Rev Bassan have proved themselves definitely hostile to the Carreb during the past year.
