I do not see precisely how the prohibition could be applied in the case of the officer engaged to be married to a lady who owns a farm in the Protectorate, but it should be made clear to <sup>the</sup> officer in ~~a number of~~ question that, if the possession of the farm by his wife is found in any way to bring his private interests into real or apparent conflict with his public duties or in any way influence him in the discharge of his duties, it will be necessary either for his wife to divest herself of the farm or for the officer to leave the service.
