PROGRESS OF EVENTS CONNECTED WITH THE UPRISING IN
TURKANA FOR THE PERIOD JUNE 26TH TO AUGUST 21ST
1917

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1. The details (See Precis)

Reference to the sketch map of Turkana enclosed with the 2nd Precis.

During the first half of June, Captain Hayne patrolled the neighbourhood of MULIAKA (1.4) on both the Eastern and western sides. He returned to LOHISTIAMA (1.5) on the 26th of June and prepared his force and transport with a view to moving permanently to a post north of that place. This move will, he thinks, have a good moral effect on the local natives, and possesses the advantage of making easier the frustration of any future attacks on the Tarash Turkana and Pedone.

2. Native reports state that Spares party has moved on to the KATHU river and is reduced in numbers. Swahilis numbering 60 strong are reported to have fled in panic at the approach of our troops. Mr. Compton arrived at LOKIAMA, as Political Officer, on July 4th. He was accompanied by 15 police and 120 auxiliaries.

6. On July 14th Mr. Crampton wrote that the latest reports of Abyssinian movements stated that they were still in force at MULIKA and were collecting a large number of DONYINU, MAKJING and other riflemen, preparatory to an attack on the AMALU SOK.

6. It is further reported that the recent movement of EBB with a large body of Turkana riflemen towards the AMALU, with the avowed object of attacking the SAMBURU, was, in reality directed against the AMALU SOK. The raid broke down owing to the AMALU being in flood and the raiders have returned north.

7. On July 24th Captain Payne left MULIKA with 70 rank and file of the 1st/6th King's African Rifles Mr Crampton, 15th police and 160 Sok levies, with the intention of rounding up a party of hostile Turkana reported to be in the neighbourhood of Mount WINGUTA (K. S.). On the 26th it was reported that the Turkana had left AMALU and the patrol to that place was therefore disbanded, and an attempt was made to dispose of those Turkana from LALIKI who were to be found in TAKAM (K. S.) Two men and one woman were captured, including a Turkana, formerly employed as a guide and helper by Abyssinians and amakihi Outlaws. The patrol returned to MULIKA on July 28th.

8. Information obtained from their native and other sources confirms the rumour that Apur has moved north. He has returned to a place called KAILI which is some ^{four} days march off LALIKI and is apparently the place known by some of the local tribes as KALI-KALI. The description of the place is as follows:-

9. Apars has been known to the Turkana for some years past, but it is only within the last two years or so that he has established a post at ~~MURU~~. This post is in British territory and the Abyssinians are stated to have levied taxes on the Turkana living in the neighbourhood at the rate of two dollars per annum.

10. Information received from various sources shows that Apars and his followers have had a large share of the cattle captured from the SUK and KANAKUA in the recent raids, and the greater part of this stock has now been removed to Abyssinia.

11. The Officer-in-Charge MURU (A.8) reports that on or about July 27th, the Bokos in the Sudan sixty miles north of LUTUR (A.7) were attacked by a force of Abyssinians and auxiliaries estimated 1200 rifles. The raid continued for three days and, on the fourth day, the raiders were collecting their loot preparatory to departing, while the Bokos were gathering in thousands to attack. No further details have as yet come to hand.

12. On July 26th Mr. Grampian reports that information had been received to the effect that ~~KAM~~ had raided the Bokos, and was en route back to LUBIK with the cattle having passed LUGHAM (A.2) on his return some days previous to this report he also reports that Leekaken, son of the witch doctor KOMBIANG, raided the Bokos and took the cattle to the JAMARILLS (A.2). No details are available as to the amount of stock captured.

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Captain Wayne K.C. is in the neighbourhood of MELIBA with A Company 5th King's African Rifles less than halfies of Mr. Duff. Crumpton is working with him as medical officer, and is accompanied by 15 police 100 Suk levies. Lt Lieutenant Francis was due to arrive at MELIBA on August 1st with 20 men and file. A genuine gun is being sent to Captain Wayne.

Lieutenant H.S. Doherty fell sick on arrival at Meliba (A.4) and left for Nairobi on July 25th. The men of the 1/4th King's African Rifles remain at Meliba and KALESSA (E.3) as garrison troops.

Mr. Bruce is at Kachaliba with 24 police and 15 of the 1/4th King's African Rifles.

Mr. Hodge has proceeded to Kalesia to replace Souldersoo, and Mr. Bent is going to Turkana to relieve Mr. Trafford.

Lieutenant Tupper is at MONOTU with some 80 men filed of the Northern Garrison. These men are split into detachments and posted at various places on the plateau.

4. The Govt of the Soudan
has undertaken to co-operate
with the E.A.P. troops when
active measures are taken
against the raiders. In the
meantime a suggestion has
been made by Capt. Darley,
an officer of the K.A.R. who is
well acquainted with the
district, that if the Boma
Plateau in the Soudan,
near the boundaries of
the E.A.P. and of Abyssinia,
were occupied, it would
do much to prevent future
raids. The O.A.G. of the E.A.P.
is consulting the Gov.-Gen.
of the Soudan as to this
suggestion.
