601 11th September your telegram 4th September  
coal requirements Uganda Railway 2,750 tons per month  
or 33,000 tons per annum. Have not been able to yet  
obtain requirements of Director of Railways Dares-  
Salaam but believe that consumption about 3,000 tons  
per month will telegraph as soon as possible about this.  
Would prefer total weight for whole year for Uganda  
Railway to be ordered in first instance. If coal can-  
not be shipped Uganda Railway will not stop work and  
cost of wood fuel will not be more than cost of coal  
but it would be necessary lay down thirty miles light  
tramway on the section between Nairobi and Coast. On  
this section at least 2000 men will have to be constan-  
tly employed on fuel cutting with reliefs which will represent  
total number 11,000 for the whole year. In view of a  
extreme difficulty now being experienced in obtaining  
adequate labour supplies for section between Nairobi  
and lake where work easier and condition of recruitment  
much more favourable I cannot give any assurance that  
this number will be maintained and I consider that it  
is improbable. For his part Director of Railways states  
that complete dependence on wood fuel too risky. Trust  
that you will be able to arrange retention of ships on  
this service as otherwise efficient working of railways  
would be seriously jeopardised.

## COAL FOR UGANDA RAILWAY.

In Mr. Sheldrick's absence from town, your letter to him dated yesterday was opened by the writer. We have pleasure in confirming that upon your entering into a contract with us to supply 50,000 tons coal for East Africa during 1918, such contract shall carry the option to you to take any quantity up to a second 50,000 tons, prior to 31st December 1918, subject to declaration by you as to actual quantity required, not later than 30th June 1918. That is to say, your contract with us for 1918 will be for anything between a minimum quantity of 50,000 tons, and a maximum quantity of 100,000 tons. It would be impossible for us to arrange that the minimum quantity should not be stated forthwith, as failing fixture of this, we could not make the necessary arrangements with the suppliers who require to know.
