In reply to your letter of the 5th ult. (No.48595/1914): I have the honour to request you to be good enough to convey to Mr. Secretary Harcourt the thanks of my council for the copies of the East Africa Protectorate Drugs and Poisons Ordinance, 1909, and of the Malta Sanitary Law of 1901 as amended by Ordinance No.V of 1906.

I have be directed by the Council to submit the following observations:-

EAST AFRICA PROTECTORATE ORDINANCE. Section 11 (a) grants registration as a "Druggist" to a "duly qualified Chem-"ist and Druggist in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and "Ireland", but the title "Pharmaceutical Chemist" is not mentioned.

The "Chemist & Druggists"of Ireland are entitled to sell poisons, but not to compound medical prescriptions, in fact they only differ from our "Registered Druggists" in respect of the title; moreover, they are persons who were in business upwards of 24 years ago and are mostly well-advanced in age, and, as the Section of the Act under which they were registered lapsed in 1891, their number is rapidly decreasing.

I am to ask that recognition of this Society's License to act as a Pharmaceutical Chemist may be granted in the Bast Africa Protectorate.

MALTA ORDINANCE. It is noticed that Chapter IV deals with the practice of Pharmacy; or "Parmeta", as in the Italian version. In the text of the Chapter, however, the words "farmacista", and "farmacisti", are translated "apothecary", and "apothecaries" respectively; whilst the word "farmacia" is rendered "dispensary" and "pharmacy". The different Sections appear to indicate that the word "Apothecary" has been used to denote "One who practises pharmacy; a skilled person who prepares drugs for medicinal uses, and keeps them for sale"; according to the definition of Dr. Charles Annandale.

As it might be contended that, as far as Ireland i concerned, only bicentiates of the Apothecaries' Hall of Dublin are eligible: my council will be glad to know whether Pharmaceutical Chemists of Ireland will be recognized as entitled to "keep open shop" in Malta.
