When it must be expressly recognised that we are committing ourselves to expenditure on the making of the road & on the provision of river-craft. Up to this point we have ostensibly been making preliminary enquiries, but anything further becomes an authority to the Govt to proceed.

The road is estimated to cost £1500<sup>x</sup> or £2250<sup>x</sup>, according to the time (3 months or 6 months) taken in constructing it. We had better put it at the higher figure. We know that labour is scarce. The launch & lighters for the tuba were estimated to cost £700 in 1914 ( $\frac{90}{20664 \cdot 14}$ ). We had better double that for present prices. Even so, the launch may be unobtainable. So we come to £30,000 or £40,000 for the preliminary cost, apart from that of the actual operations.

I do not mention this by way

of suggesting that the cost of expenditure  
should not be undertaken. I think  
it should. It should be met from  
balances, & should be treated as  
Protectorate war expenditure. Goodness  
knows when we shall have as good a  
chance again of clearing up this  
troublesome corner of the Pt. Even  
if no military expedition ensued  
the expenditure on the road & river  
works would greatly simplify the  
task of future administration.

But it is just as well to point  
out that this is the moment of decision  
as to incurring the expenditure or not.

Sir,

I am commanded by the Army Council to acknowledge the receipt of Colonial Office letter No. 2344/17 of January 17th, on the subject of the construction of a road from Kismayu to Serenli in Jubaland, and the projects for re-occupying Serenli and our posts in that Province.

In reply I am to state that in the opinion of the Council any military operations involving a call upon the force now employed in German East Africa must, in existing circumstances, be deferred until the conclusion of hostilities in that theatre, but it would appear desirable that work on the road should be pushed forward as far as is possible without military assistance other than that available on the spot.

From a report recently rendered by Major Forcelli, 5th Regiment, K.A. rifles, it appears that it should be feasible to construct the track as far as Segari (75 m. from Serenli) without calling on any troops other than those already in Jubaland.

The Council assume that Mr. Secretary Long is in possession of copies of Major Forcelli's report, and of the report dated 16th November, 1916, (based upon Major Forcelli's), compiled by the Public Works Department, Nairobi.

to proceed with the scheme  
and the vessels were  
never obtained.
