Express regret that the rule¹⁸ as stated in the letter from this Department of 30th March, that officers of the local East African Forces when absent from East Africa draw British Army rates of pay without allowances. Say, however, that in view of the fact that he has no home in this country, the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate will be asked by despatch whether a special grant cannot, in the circumstances, be made to him, and say that he will be informed further on this matter.

With regard to 17166, say that, as he appears to have received a free railway warrant from the military authorities in connection with his journey to London to see the Medical Adviser, it is not clear what special expenses were incurred by him in connection with the visit, ask whether we are to understand that it was

Please be pleased to acknowledge receipt of your letter
of 15th Feb/1913 and will be very grateful if it is the rule
in office of H. M. Govt. Africa to allow allowances to
H. M. Consul, in the pay of British Army rates,
without allowances. This is the regulation
quoted by me in my letter of the 27th inst., to indicate
this, and I am of the opinion that the term
"Army rates" means pay & allowances paid to officers
of H. M. British Army of corresponding rank, under similar
circumstances.

In regard para 2 of your letter, I beg to inform you
that I have relatives in this country, but none with whom
I can stay. My home is in Rhodesia, but my wife and
boy are in England at present and I have been obliged
to take a house. Under the circumstances I have found
it quite impossible to live on 12/- per day and I trust
that the allowances which I consider should be paid
under "Army rates" may be granted me.
