Secret. 1. This name appears in ~~Major~~ Col. Notley's Report

XIV on Swedish activities as connected with Blixen
Finecke and his associates. No details stated.

2. "Rundgren, Kikuyu" and "Rundgren, Athi River" appear as taking part in an unexplained telegraphic correspondence in April 1917, see Report No. XIV (Continuation). That report quotes ^{also} a letter from Rundgren to Ake Sjögren, Stockholm which shows the former as closely connected with the black-listed Swedo-African Coffee Company.

3. In November and December 1917 two applications to lease land in the F.A.P. were made to the local ~~Commissioner~~ Rundgren and refused. Rundgren was ~~in~~ ^{with} Axel Bildt with £4,500 ~~capital~~ in the ~~intend~~ to purchase the Gilgil Estates. The ~~intend~~ be failing ~~to~~ ⁱⁿ the Alienation of Property (Restrictions) Ordinance, 1917.

Dear General Kell,

With reference to your letter of the 11th of December (No. 17158/M.I. S.D.2.), we have telegraphed to the Acting Governor of the East Africa Protectorate asking whether there is any objection to the grant of a visa to enable Ekendahl to proceed to East Africa.

Our reason for doing so is that we are far from sure that Ekendahl's employer, Rundgren, is a person to whom any assistance should be given. His name appears in Lieutenant Colonel Notley's reports Nos. XIV and XIV (Continuation) which you sent to us in your letters of the 6th of July and the 6th of September 1917. (reference No. 194862/D); it is also mentioned in paragraphs 12 and 13 of Mr. Bowring's Secret despatch of the 27th of December, a copy of which was sent to you in my letter of the 27th of February.
