Reply to your letter of the 22nd ultimo, No. 3078/1918, regarding  
Mrs. Annie Leach, mother of the late No. 12188, Corporal  
(Miss Funnell) of the East African Military Labour Bureau, I am  
by the Minister of Pensions to acquaint you that if the soldier  
serving in the British Army, and provided that his death was  
in whole or in part attributable to or aggravated by active service, the  
widow would be eligible for pension at the ascertained rate of her  
husband's pay on her son prior to the War, or his enlistment if later, from  
a rate of 3/6 weekly to a maximum of 15/- weekly.  
Steps have been taken with a view to carrying out the Local  
enquiries necessary to determine the extent if any, of such  
entitlement, and you will be informed as early as possible of the result.
