In scrip to your letter of the 5th ultimo, 58329/1917,

regarding the case of Mrs. Hewlett, mether of Corporal W.R. Hewlett, Dist African Military Labour Bureau, I am directed by the Minister of Pensions to acquaint you that if the soldier had been serving in the British Army, the claimant would have been eligible for pension, within a limit of 15/- meskly, at the ascertained rate of her pre-war (or pre-enlistment, 17 later), dependence. Local investigation is necessary to determine the extent, 15 any, of such dependence, and steps have been taken with a viscott and overlying out this investigation.

I am, however, to state the under certain recent concessions, pensions may be granted to soldiers parents who are meapable of self-support through infinity or age and in pecuniary need, irrespective of prior dependence, and this case uppears one in which a grant under this concession sould be considered. If, as appears probable the claimant has no message apart from her old age Pension, a pension of 8/- would be swarded to this office.

A further communication on the case will be addressed to you as good as possible.
