My Lord,

I have the honour to acknowledge the
receipt of Your Lordship's despatches Nos. 324 and
400 of April 22nd and May 14th respectively with
reference to the Kikuyu Reserve.

1. There has never been any intention on the
part of this Government to take any action
of a coercive nature against
the Kikuyu or any other native community
in connection with European or Colonial wants.

2. In view of a proposal made by Mr. G. H. Mackay
in his report sent to the Legislative Council
in January last, a ten mile road has been
constructed and disposed of by the Government.

3. It is proposed to extend this road to the
Kikuyu Reserve.

4. I do not think that any further communication
to General Lamey is needed, as my policy in this
respect has been publicly announced in my address
to the Legislative Council at its first session
after my arrival last February.
