Dr. Hemsted came to see me the other day to express his desire for temporary service in East Africa. I told him that I could not give him a definite answer as the matter was not in entirely in my hands, but that he must not be disappointed if the Department took the line that they would deal with affairs in East Africa with the staff already arranged for and that it would be inconvenient to accept volunteers from this country. I advised him to make a written application, so as to get a formal and definite reply in writing, but I begged him not to take this advice as modifying in any way my opinion that the answer would not imorobably be in the negative.

He is a brother of the Hemsted's now in the East African service. He is a keen and likely looking man and would, I feel sure, be valuable if his services could

could be utilised. He explained to me that he was not looking for a paying job, and that, if it would make any difference to his chances of getting temporary employment with our forces in East Africa, he would go without salary and pay his own passage out. I feel it incumbent on me to let you know what impression he made on me, but you will of course understand that I am not in any way urging that he should be employed. The decision on that point must be made on quite other grounds and by the Department.

Dear Ethel,

Many thanks for your letter dated Aug. 11th. which I
we just received.

I can readily imagine the condition of London at the
present time, we are ourselves in no better plight. There have
been several encounters with German East Africa, the details of
which no doubt you have read in the papers, and we shall, I hope,
soon claim this territory for our own.

It is now almost a month since my release, and had it not
been for the kind hospitality of some fellows whom I met on the
voyage, should now be in a sorry plight. I have sold my camera
and several other articles in order to live.

There is absolutely no possibility of my returning to
Kenya until after cessation of hostilities, and in consideration
of my being practically an undesirable the Officials are
recommending my case to the Governor of the Colony for passage to
England, and, I hope, Compensation. Welter wishes me to return
as soon as matters are settled.

Should my case be successful, I shall return by a Union
Steamship boat which leaves here on the 30th. and returns via the
Suez, taking for the voyage, I should estimate about six or seven
weeks. I have seen and read all the Daily Mirrors up to the

11th. August, re the War.

Has Bert volunteered for service? Had I been in
England I should have done so, I should have done so here; but
I was put into prison instead.

Well Ethel, if I should return it would not be possible
for me to write you in the meantime, but will wire you from
Southampton.
