 during the year 1914 due to the

 The resolution has been adopted by the

 will be submitted to Your Lordship herewith
 for your approval before introduction into the
 Legislative Council.

taken to secure what would be required without
delay as suggested in Your Lordship's telegram
of December 1st, and action in this respect is

new force, a position for which his training
and experience in the South African War, the
late local campaign, and as Officer Commanding
Nairobi Defence Force render him most suitable.
It may be advisable at a later date to ask for
the appointment of a seconded regular officer.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ORGANISATION
THE EUROPEAN INHABITANTS OF THE EAST AFRICAN
PROTECTORATE FOR THE DEFENCE THEREOF.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make provision for
the European inhabitants of the said Protectorate for the Defence
thereof, and for the protection of life and property
therein;

IT IS THEREFORE ENACTED by the Governor of
the said Protectorate by and with the advice
and consent of the Legislative Council thereof:-

PART I.

Constitution and Organisation
of a Defence Force.

title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Defence Force (East Africa Protectorate) Ordinance, 1919" and shall come into force on such date as the Governor by Proclamation published in the Official Gazette shall determine.

2.

4. Subject to the proviso to this Section,
and to all the other provisions of this

Ordinance or of any Rules issued by
every male person of European descent
between the ages of 16 years and

(both inclusive) and now resident in Africa after
residing in the Protectorate shall within one
month after the date this Ordinance shall come
into force or within one month of becoming so
resident as aforesaid as the case may be
enroll himself, and in default of enrolling
himself within such month as aforesaid shall
be deemed to be enrolled in the Defence Force
of the Protectorate which shall be under the
supreme command of the Governor and shall be
liable to render general military service in
any part of East Africa within or without the
Protectorate for the defence thereof or any
part thereof or for the protection of life
and property therein or for part thereof.
PROVIDED ALWAYS that members of any
recognised Association and members of the
Medical and Veterinary professions shall
only be enrolled or deemed to be enrolled
and liable to serve in their professional
capacity.

5. Every member enrolled or deemed to be
enrolled in the Defence Force of the
Protectorate as aforesaid before provided shall
take a oath in writing applicable to his
case prescribed in Part II of Schedule I
to this Ordinance.

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and in every such case the owner shall be paid by the Government the value of the same, such value to be certified by the Commandant of the Force to which such mounted member belongs.

PROVIDED ALWAYS that such value in the case of a horse shall not exceed Rupees 450; in the case of a mule Rupees 300; in the case of a saddle Rupees 60; in the case of a bridle Rupees 20.

13. Every member of the Defence Force called out on active service under the provisions of this Ordinance shall receive rations or ration allowance and pay on a scale as the Governor may, from time to time prescribe.

14. Any member of the Defence Force totally or partially disabled or injured permanently in health owing to wounds, injuries or disease received occurring or contracted while on active service shall receive compensation or a pension in accordance with the provisions of and on the scale contained in the Royal Warrant for Pay for the time being.

15. Every member of the Defence Force travelling by rail to any place or places on duty shall be entitled on production of a duly signed certificate certifying that the bearer is so travelling on duty, to a free Railway pass for himself (and his horse or mule if any) to such place or places as aforesaid.

ARMS AND AMMUNITION.

18. All rifles and ammunition shall be provided by the Government for members of the Defence Force and will only be issued in case of the Forces or part of the Force being called out.

19. Every member of the Defence Force in possession of a Government rifle as hereinbefore provided shall be responsible for the same and for keeping the same in a good and efficient condition and shall be liable for any damage to such rifle due to his act neglect or default.

20. The Governor may by Rules published in the Official Gazette make provision for all or any of the following matters, that is to say:-

(a) the inspection and storage of Government Rifles:

(b) the amount storage and possession of ammunition for Government Rifles;

(c) the duties of the Government Storekeeper in respect of all rifles and ammunition in his District;

(d) the purchase of service rifles and ammunition from the Government by members of the Defence Force;

(e) the imposition of penalties for any breach of duty by a member of the Defence Force in respect of any Government rifle.

(b) No sentence of death shall be passed upon the trial of members of the Indian Constabulary Force shall be carried into effect unless confirmed by the Governor.

(II) For the purposes of discipline, the provisions of the Army Act 44 of 1883, Victoria Chapter 58 and all Acts amending or substituted for the same, so far as applicable shall apply to the Indian Constabulary staff appointed under Section 17 of this Act, subject to the modifications set out in subsection (I)(a) and (b) of this Section.

PART IV.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISION

(1) Any officer or member of the Indian Constabulary Force who after publication of such Proclamation as is referred to in section 26 hereof or after such calling up as is mentioned in section 27 hereof shall without reasonable cause or excuse fail or neglect to appear for or shall absent himself from service on any occasion or shall withdraw himself before permission to that effect be given by some competent authority or shall refuse or wilfully neglect to obey any lawful command of his superior officer shall, without prejudice to any other offence of such conduct he may have committed, on conviction by a Magistrate entitled to hold a Subordinate Court of the First or Second Class, be liable

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for the time being of the Uganda Defence Force.





Large tract of country dedicated to farming but

Right to catch deer, foxes, unlimited numbers

even provided that the shooting districts and game
are not disturbed. (Elk are very plentiful).

Capture game animals in restricted numbers and
restricts.

Catch ordinary animals, unlimited.

Catch birds unlimited.

In general way it appears that a great deal is asked
with little offered in return. Whereas in the

United States the land useless to themselves or anyone
else for now the very best is stipulated. On

the other hand Officer I find no land is available in
any districts mentioned. The sum of \$10,000 to be expended

annually for four years represents the revenue from
game for one normal year but does not represent more than

one third of the money brought into the country by Sportsmen.
The doubtful revenue from the 5% offered on their investments

will not be as much as Sportsmen pay for right to shoot the
game so that from a financial point of view we could not
afford it.

I cannot help feeling that the scheme, a good one in
my opinion, is not being looked upon as a business proposition
by its founders. They seem to think that they are public
charities and as such entitled to every sort of facility
to do what ever they like.

I am not in any way opposed to a reasonable proposition
but it must be clearly stated that the many special

facilities

as we will have everyone in the
