My reasons for this are as follows:

(1) I am the owner of the above rubber plantations.

(2) Rubber Plantation to

Rubber Plantation Setai, 200 acres, District of Tan

Cotton Plantation Tapoy, 100 acres, District of Lindi.

These are now without

At present Myself in control of the following companies

(1) Deutsche Pflanzenground Handels-Gesellschaft, Limited, Plantation Mayo, 375 acres, District of Wilhelmstal,

(2) Cern Composite A.G., Mohesa, Rubber Cleaning Factory in the District of Tanga.

Holding full powers of attorney for these companies I am in the case of the Cern Company responsible for an amount of several hundreds of tons of Rubber, delivered to our Factory for cleaning purposes before outbreak of the war. This rubber belongs to some forty plantations, including several of British ownership.

It is my duty to ascertain, at the first opportunity, what happened to the various lots, and to decide how the different claims of the owners to be disposed of.

As regards the two Prisoners of War mentioned above I am prepared to take the full responsibility as to their well-behaviour and am ready to grant to them the necessary means of subsistence.
