C. S. M. Barrance:

Reports arrival on 3 Aug at Soho and admission to Netley Hospital. Requests arrangements be made to transfer to civil asylum.

In tractig,

I saw the Board of Control on this case. They were not particularly helpful. The M.G.P. informed me that their arrangement is that on a non-commissioned man of the British Army who becomes a (1) patient or public (pauper) asylum and treated as a private patient - In point of fact there is practically no difference between their treatment and that of the pauper, understand? (2) If the relatives wish he can be put into a private home and granted the maximum pension, any charge a sum that amount being borne by the relatives.

Wrote to Mr C. Barrance (47675 pg) and left him that we are in communication with the G.

The case; that there has arisen some difficulty as to his  
disposal as he was not serving under Govt Army  
Regns.; that I hope that similar arrangement  
can be made for her ~~for~~ <sup>as</sup> those made for Dr. Foucault  
~~now~~<sup>now</sup> that he shall be admitted to a public  
asylum and be treated as a private patient there;  
perhaps they would prefer her to be admitted  
into a pte. asy home; if so they would prefer this,  
would they be prepared to pay the difference between  
the grant made on the account by the Deptt and  
the total cost of her maintenance in such a home,  
in the event of the cost of such maintenance being  
more than the amount granted from C.O. funds;  
ask for an early reply.

I To W O saying that the Govt  
comt will take care of his disposal, that we  
hope to speak to him. Then of course as I feel  
disposed at an early date, ask that in the  
mean time they will allow him to go at Netley.

When we get a reply from the Govt we can, I think, hand  
the case over to Mr G Cannell, Barton House and  
ask him to deal with it on our behalf. He agreed  
to this the morning of

14 Dec.  
I asked him to come to see P & ask for advice

Sir,

With reference to your letters 40902/1919 of July 16 and 44790/1919 of the 8th August regarding Company Sergeant Major N.C. Barrance, East African Military Labour Corps, I am commanded by the Army Council to state for the information of Viscount Milner, that this Warrant Officer arrived at Southampton on August 3 and was admitted to the Royal Victoria Hospital, Netley.

I am to point out, however, that as he has been discharged from the service he cannot be allowed to remain in this hospital, and it therefore becomes necessary for arrangements to be made without delay for his transfer to a civil asylum, unless his relatives are prepared to receive him or to make arrangements for his private treatment. It appears to the Council that as C.S.M. Barrance was resident in East Africa for a considerable time before the War the question of his disposal is one which your Department should properly deal with. It is observed that in one of the letters forwarded with your letter of the 8th August it was proposed that you should communicate with the man's brother Mr. L. Barrance, (Address, c/o E. Dixon & Sons, St. Albans, Herts), and ascertain his wishes, and, if he was not prepared to receive him, arrange for his admission to the Hertfordshire County Asylum to which he is stated to be chargeable. I am to enquire whether this has been done, and if not to request that immediate steps may be taken in the matter. A further communication will be sent to you regarding the question raised in the third paragraph of your letter of 8th August.
