Dear Private Secretary,

I have had enquiry made on the subject of your note of the 17th of March enclosing a letter to the Prime Minister's Private Secretary from Mr. de Souza Xeralfins.

As the incident referred to in that letter took place during the military occupation while the War Office was in control of the operations, it is clearly a matter for the War Office and not for the Colonial Office, to deal with.

As regards the War Office letter to which you refer, No. 0165/1087 (H.O.2.) no action was taken upon it in this Department as the letter of November 12th, 1917, which it forwarded was the same as that which we had sent to the War Office and upon which the War Office had taken action in February, 1918.

I note that Mr. Xeralfins's complaint was referred by you to the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief.

We have no further information at all upon the case

Honourable Sir,

For over 17 long months patiently waiting to have effected a complete subjugation of the G.E. Africa and the time would be ripe to seek for any redress from you and the British Public for undue insults and unmerited injuries through the influence of the first Political Officer in charge of Bukoba, to the poor man who gave the whole Bukoba district to the British Crown. Two days delay the Belgian Congo Government forces would certainly have occupied it as their rightful conquest, for, the Huns had evacuated it for their fear alone.

The British Expedition that landed at Bukoba was ordered for different end and was on its way to Mamerere to effect junction with the Belgian line from Concordia to Lake Victoria, but for the strenuous efforts of a single Portuguese Citizen, called at Bukoba (though there were several Indians in hiding) and thus the British Arms signallised a bloodless victory and conquest of a large district to the British Crown on the morning of the 26th day of Dec in 1893.

Three days later the first Political Officer took charge of Bukoba and treated the donee with gratuitous insults and later on influence assaults:- first, by Capt. Montgomery at 7.30 P.M. entered his abode, took him by the shoulder and dragged him out from his dinner while eating it; by taking 3 German employees in confidence, who had arrived ten days after the taking of Bukoba and had taken quarters about half a mile away from him, but the Political Officer shifted them to his very close neighbourhood with the sinister object of assaulting the poor man in his bed after 10 P.M., by insinuating them to bring an assault charge against him.

him and when the evidence proved the assault against his proteges fined them lightly for name sake, by doubling guards about his quarters to prevent food supplies and by taking no notice of his written complaints. Thus he the Political Officer rendered himself open to criticism and liken the smile of the mad dog that bit the hand that gave the bone, - and just like the modern arrogant military autocrat run.

The present calamity has fallen on the World solely due to the very insolent and supremely arrogant Pride of our White brothers abroad who consider non-European as social Leper. This pride has risen to the High Throne of the Almighty clamouring for the due punishment. The present war is the Providemal weapon wiping it out when the Europpitan Autocrat arrogant spirit is completely quelled and God-fearing Penitent genial spirit engendered and established in Europe in particular in America in all the world we expect Univeral Everlasting peace.

For the last time I repeat my first quote of real plastic. It is thought a foolish, imprudently and infatuatedly and ignorantly called a big So the British Airs, if General Gove, Colonial Office and Major General in Heart and conscience (and not in Fine Clothes) and are out of war and their families will prove the truth to the full of this statement.
