

VACANCY FOR A FEMALE TELEPHONIST - BRITISH EAST AFRICA.

The Postmaster General has been requested by the 198
Colonial Office to recommend a suitable candidate for the
vacancy referred to above. The conditions attaching to
the appointment are as follows:-

(1) Salary. The scale of salary is £120 rising by annual increments of £8 to £160 a year; and the commencing rate of War Bonus is £47 a year - but no promise can be made how long the War Bonus will be continued.

(2) Qualifications. Candidates should be between 26 and 33 years of age, and should be skilled in the manipulation of a Telephone Exchange Switchboard (preferably of the magneto ringing type). They should have had at least 5 years' experience of the working of a Telephone Switchboard of moderate size, say, from 300 to 1,500 subscribers.

(3) Conditions of appointment. The officer appointed will be seconded from the Home Service in the first instance for a tour of 30 months' service in East Africa and the leave incidental thereto, and at the end of that period she may either be transferred to the permanent establishment in East Africa if her services have been satisfactory and are still required by the Government, or, if she so desires, she will be released, subject to proof of satisfactory conduct and physical fitness, to the Home Service, as soon as a suitable vacancy occurs. At her salary she received at the time of her departure, and without loss of seniority.

It will also be within the power of the Governor of the Protectorate to cancel the appointment at any time within the period of an officer should he think fit, giving a free passage to the U.K. and the leave to which the Officer may be qualified by service in the Protectorate. In that event, reversion to the Home Service would be allowed, subject to a report that her official conduct

Direct had been satisfactory, on the conditions stated in the preceding paragraph.

Free Second-class Passages to and from East Africa to the place at which the officer is to be stationed will be provided.

The officer appointed will be required to enter into the usual Fidelity Guarantee Bond, the annual premium being a charge on the salary. The usual bond is for \$100 and the yearly premium 10s.

Partially furnished quarters, free of rent, but not of rates or other similar outgoings will be provided by the Government. Housing accommodation is provided in a block of quarters shared by others of the female staff, all arrangements in connexion therewith being under the direct supervision of a Matron appointed by the Government.

The officer selected will be liable for service at such Post Offices in the East Africa Protectorate as the Governor may direct.

The officer selected will be required to undertake the refund of the cost of her passage to East Africa should she leave the service of the Protectorate before the end of 30 months' service, for any other cause than illness. She would be required to leave the service on marriage, but in such case the Secretary of State for the Colonies might, on the recommendation of the Governor of the Protectorate, abate a proportion of the passage money according to the period served, provided that a clear six months' notice of the intention to marry were given.

(4) Leave. After a period of 30 months' residential service, annual leave will be granted with pay for the time necessarily taken on the outward journey plus 21 days for each completed calendar month of 1916 or earlier up to date. An officer returning to East Africa, during his annual vacation leave, a further period of leave on full pay known as "return leave" for 21 days for each completed calendar month of residential service, plus the time necessarily taken on the

journey from England. In the case of an officer serving in Uganda, and in certain "unhealthy" stations in East Africa, the leave will be calculated at the rate of 3 days for each completed month of residential service.

(5) Medical Attendance. Medical Attendance in the Protectorate will be provided free.

(6) Pensions and Marriage Gratuity. In case of marriage, a gratuity will be granted, viz., one month's pay for each year of established service up to a maximum of 12 months, on condition that two years' service in the Protectorate has been completed, and that at least six years of the total service has been performed either (a) wholly in the Protectorate, or (b) partly in the Protectorate and partly in the Imperial Post Office. Its full value will be paid for directly out of moneys provided by the Imperial Parliament. If the appointment in the Protectorate is vacated within two years, no gratuity will be payable in respect of Imperial or Colonial Service.

Pensions will be granted in accordance with the rules laid down under the Superannuation Act of 1892.

The Postmaster General has been requested by the Colonial Office to recommend a suitable candidate for the vacancy referred to above. The conditions attaching to the 201 appointment are as follows:-

(1) Salary. The scale of salary is £120 rising by annual increments of £8 to £160 a year; and the commencing rate of War Bonus is £47 a year - but no promise can be made how long the War Bonus will be continued.

(2) Qualifications. Candidates should be between 26 and 33 years of age, and should be skilled in the manipulation of a Telephone Exchange Switchboard (preferably of the magneto ringing type). They should have had at least 5 years' experience of the working of a Telephone Switchboard of moderate size, say from 300 to 1,500 subscribers.

(3) Conditions of appointment. The officer appointed will be seconded from the Home Service in the first instance for a tour of 30 months' service in East Africa and the leave incidental thereto, and at the end of that period she may either be transferred to the permanent establishment in East Africa if her services have been satisfactory and are still required by the Government, or, if she so desires, she will be allowed, subject to proof of satisfactory conduct and physical fitness, to return to the Home Service, as soon as a suitable opportunity occurs, at the salary she received at the time of her departure and with her seniority. She will be entitled to receive a gratuity for services at such rate as may be determined by the Governor of the Protectorate.

The gratuity will be paid quarterly.

The officer will be required to take the sum of one month's passage to East Africa should she leave the British East African Protectorate before the end of her engagement, i.e. for any other cause than illness. She will be required to leave the service on marriage, but in such case the Secretary of State for the Colonies may, upon the recommendation of the Governor of the Protectorate, make

a proportion of the passage money according to the period served, provided that a clear six months' notice of the intention to marry were given.

(4) Leave. At the end of 30 months' residential service, vacation leave will be granted with full pay for the time necessarily taken on the journey to England, plus 24 days for each completed calendar month of residential service. In the case of an officer returning to East Africa, there may be added to the vacation leave a further period of leave in full pay known as "return leave" for 24 days for each completed calendar month of residential service, plus 24 days taken on the journey to England. In the case of an officer returning to India, the same number of days may be granted as the equivalent of the days of leave in full pay for each completed month of residential service.

(5) Medical Attendance. Medical attendance in the Protectorate will be free.

(6) Pensions and Gratuity.

In the event of an officer's death, a gratuity will be granted, viz., one month's pay per annum for each completed year of residential service up to a maximum of 12 months, on condition that two years' service in the Protectorate has been completed and an aggregate of five years' service in the Home and East African Postal Services. If the appointment in the Protectorate is vacated within two years, no gratuity will be payable in respect of the Imperial or Colonial Service.

If the officer is confirmed in his appointment in the Permanent Commission in East Africa, he will be entitled to pension in respect of his services in the Protectorate separately upon the basis of rank and seniority, in accordance with the provisions of section 140 of the Valuation Act.

If on the other hand, the officer reverts to the Home Service and ultimately retires from that Service under conditions qualifying her for a pension she will receive pensions calculated separately in respect of her service in East Africa in the manner explained above.
