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With reference to your letter of the 21st February 1918,
GCO 67409/1, and previous correspondence, I am pleased
to advise you that the Postmaster General has directed that
the post offices in British East Africa. I am directed by the
Postmaster General to transmit herewith, for the information of
the Secretary of State, a copy of a telegram from the Post
Master, Nairobi, dated the 9th ultimo, from which it will be
seen that the stations at Mombasa and Kisumu are now open for
general public correspondence and that the coast charge for
a message exchanged with ships is in each case 60 centimes a
word without a minimum.

The rate which is now proposed to charge for
transmission over the inland telegraph system or radiotelegrams
terminating at Mombasa or Kisumu in British East Africa or
elsewhere, namely sixteen centimes a word with a sum of one
pence sent by cable, is lower than that proposed
in the Circular Letter of 6th October 1915.

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No. 39878/15) and would appear to be inadmissible under Article 16 (2) of the Service Regulations to the Radiotelegraph Convention, which provides that this charge "must not exceed on the average that of the inland rate" of the country. Unless therefore the inland telegraph rate has been increased since 1915, I am to suggest, for the consideration of the Secretary of State, that the East African Government should be asked to bring the rate for the inland transmission of radiotelegrams into conformity with it.
