With reference to your letter No. 20068/1919 of the 27th  
I am directed by the Minister of Pensions to inform you  
a claim of Mrs. Ada Dixon, mother of the late Driver H.T.  
South African Transport Corps, has been reconsidered under  
recent scheme for the parents of young unmarried soldiers, and  
been decided that had her son been serving in the British  
Army at the time of his death she would have been eligible for a  
sum of £1 a week with effect from 8th November, 1918.

Upon receipt of a reply to the effect that you concur with  
this, steps will be taken to authorise payment and to charge  
down Agents for the Colonies in due course.
