As directed by the Minister of Pensions to acknowledge the receipt of your letter (7213/1918-19) of the 21st ultimo stating that it is not considered practicable to form a colony in the Highlands of the East African Protectorate for discharged sailors and soldiers suffering from tuberculosis or the effects of gas.

I am, however, to point out that this was not exactly the subject of my letter of the 17th August 1918, to which up to the present, no reply has been received. It was understood some time ago that an early reply was expected from the Governors of the Protectorates in East Africa as to the prospects for disabled officers and men in various occupations on the land and generally, and also as to the intentions of the Government with regard to providing land for intending settlers in the suitable locations. A matter of considerable importance in view of the increasing number of disabled officers and men of a number of drafts of them it is desirable to find out what the prospects are for them in the Protectorates as a whole and to see that they are thoroughly
