ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES

(DATED 5TH DECEMBER 1918.)

IMPORTATION OF DOGS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 2).

294

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The period of detention and isolation prescribed by the Importation of Dogs Order of 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") is hereby increased to six calendar months, and the principal Order shall be read and have effect as if six calendar months were substituted for the three months.

In the said Order, the words "three months" shall be read as "six months".
