

BRITISH EAST AFRICA DISABLED OFFICERS COLONY

Your letter of the 16th inst., was considered at a meeting of our Provisional Committee held on the 21st inst., and I am asked to reply as follows:-

We appreciate the necessity that the Government of the Protectorate should be satisfied in regard to the management and organization of the scheme and welcome their assistance and participation in our proposals. We note that you are ascertaining the views of the Ministries of Pensions and Labour.

For the information of the Secretary of State I enclose

- (a) a list of the names of the Disabled Officers present at the meeting held at the Great Eastern Hotel on the 16th June last.
- (b) a list of the officers of special experience who are prepared to assist in the development of the proposed Colony with details of their experience.

I enclose also two proof prints of the Rules which have been revised to meet the points raised in your letter under reply and I may point out:-

- (1) In regard to draft rules (5) and (6) it is the intention of the promoters that the scheme shall be under

taken and developed exclusively for the benefit of disabled Officers, but it was thought undesirable that the language of the Rules should be too rigidly confined. The language of the Lease will no doubt impose any restrictions which the Government deems necessary to secure the proper development of the land and to justify the grant of special terms, but questions may easily arise in regard to which too exact verbal restrictions might defeat the main purpose - As an instance only it might be desirable that a particular area should undergo experimental management and cultivation under the control of an expert not a member.

In regard to draft Rule (7) the Provisional Committee advised that it is no infringement of the provisions of the Registration of Societies Act 1893 for a Society to have a larger interest than £200 so long as the shares are held in shares. The Committee further advised that in respect of that form of shareholding the Society can make its own rules in the provision

for the election of members in any way of meeting the difficulty. It is noted that sub-head 'e' of your letter only will be to provide that the quorum at the first General Meeting shall be 40 members - This

provision will render it necessary for the Provisional Committee to admit sufficient members at once to enable the meeting to be held. It seems more convenient that the Society should be permitted to come into existence and appoint the Selection Committee rather than attempt to confirm by the Rules ex post facto the operations of a selection Committee acting without authority.

It arises in the further difficulty in the method suggested in your letter, that s. 5 (2) of the Industrial & Provident Societies Act 1893 expressly provides that an application to register shall be signed by seven members and the Secretary.

As regards the points mentioned in sub-heads (f), (g) and (h) to follow, they have been raised in the sense indicated.

With regard to the point mentioned in sub-head (f), I would like to point out that the proposals contained in the letter from Mr. G. H. Price would propose to take the name of the Society, and to secure the services of a solicitor and a notary public. They would then hold a meeting of the members of the Society to admit members & to give power to the Executive Committee to act in the ordinary general business of the Society.

With regard to the point mentioned in sub-head (g), I would like to point out that the Executive Committee would be entitled to make that
