Sir,

I am directed to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State, with the following facts relating to the case of Lieutenant Hamilton Moore, late East African Military Labour Corps, who was released from service on the 9th April, 1919.

A letter numbered M.P.O. 25498 has been received from the Military Pensions Commissioner, Pretoria, stating that the Imperial Pensions Board has awarded the Officer a pension based on 30% disability from the 10th April, 1919, to the 31st October, 1919, and enclosing Medical Board reports dated the 7th April and 1st May 1919.

The medical authorities of this Department consider that the disability is attributable to military service, assess the degree of disablement as 30% and recommend further medical examination after a period of six months from the date of the last medical board, the 1st May 1919.

Had the Officer served under British Army regulations he would have been awarded temporary retired pay at the rate of £52.10.0 a year from the 10th April, 1919, to the 31st October, 1919. A bonus of 20% would have been added to the award.

Disability:— Abscess over right elbow as the result of fly bites
in North West East.

Statement of Case.

The answers to the following questions are to be filled in by the Officer in medical charge of the covering them, he will carefully discriminate between the man's unsupported statements and evidence recorded in diary and medical documents. He will also carefully distinguish cases entirely due to venereal disease.

Origin of disability: January, 1919.

Summarily the essential facts of the disability, noting entries in Medical History Sheet bearing on case.

STATES:—

that he had numerous bites on his body as the result of tropical flies. One of these marks on his right elbow became inflamed while in Pretoria after his discharge from service in Durban as the result of Malaria & Iritis? due to malaria & tropical service. Admitted 17/4/19. Abscess opened 21/4/19. Boarded as patient in hospital.

Your opinion as to the causation of disability, stating whether in your opinion it is—

(b) In case of details from East or Central Africa, state date of last return to Union.

14. (a) State whether the disability is clearly attributable to:—

- (i) A/S during the present war? Yes.
- (ii) Climate (causing special liability to the disease in question)? No.
- (iii) Constitutional predisposition or heredity? No.
- (iv) Want of proper care (e.g. misconduct or intemperance) on the part of the officer or man? No.

(b) If due to either of the first three of these causes, to what specific conditions is it attributed? Result of Fly Bites.

(c) attributable to or aggravated by service during the present war, climate, or ordinary military service. (The specific condition to which it is attributed should be stated, see Notes on page 3).

(d) constitutional or hereditary, and not aggravated by service during the present war.

(e) attributable to or aggravated by want of proper care on the man's part, e.g., intemperance, misconduct, &c.

Opinion of the Medical Board.

Answers to the following questions are to be carefully filled in by the Board, the object of the man being invalided, it is essential that the Minister of Pensions should be in possession of the most reliable information to enable him to decide upon the man's claim to pension.

Expressions such as "may," "might," "probably," &c. should be avoided.

The rates of pension vary directly according to whether the disability is (1) caused or aggravated by the present war, (2) due to causes not connected with present war, viz. (a) active service, (2) climatic or pre-war service, (3) ordinary military service before the war. It is therefore essential when assigning a disability to differentiate between them.

In answering question 21 the Board should be careful to discriminate between disease resulting in ordinary conditions and disease to which the soldier would have been equally liable in civil life.

A disability is to be regarded as due to climate when it is caused by military service abroad in a place where there is a special liability to contract the disease.

General Medical Officer's report of medical officer in charge

Whether the disability is clearly attributable to—

(1) Service during the present war. Yes.

(4) Whether it is constitutional or hereditary. No.

Is it due to one of the first three of these causes to what specific conditions do the Board attribute it? No.

Has the disability been aggravated by the conditions mentioned in question 21, and if so, by what? No.

Is the disability permanent? No.

If permanent, how soon do the Board recommend re-examination? Cured.

What is the degree of disablement at such an examination, in the Board's opinion, he should be assessed for pension purposes at present? Nil.

Degrees of disablement should be expressed in the following percentages:—

100, 75, 60, 50, 40, 30, 20, less than 20.

Was an operation advised and declined, or the refusal unreasonable? operation performed.

Does the Board recommend—

(a) Discharge as permanently unfit, or

(b) Change to England? Leave? No. Pension? No.

If discharge is recommended it should be stated whether further medical treatment (including orthopaedic training) is desirable in a—

(a) Sanatorium.

(b) Hospital.

(c) Convalescent home;

(d) Asylum; or

(e) Other institution either as an in-patient or an out-patient, and if so the period for which recommended. Not required.

With reference to Army Council Instruction No. 144 of 1917, is any surgical appliance recommended?

Does the man require the constant attendance of another person? Confirmed.
