I beg to submit my name for favourable consideration in connection with the vacancies for Telegraph Engineering Assistants in East Africa and Uganda Protectorates as intimated in the Post Office Circular of 22nd inst.

I have had over 20 years service in the Engineering Dept. being temporarily employed at first in the Superintending Engineer's Office, York Place in 1897. While in that Office until my promotion as Sub-Engineer in 1902 I was engaged for varying periods on most of the Office duties viz:- Typing, Plans, Stores, Wayleaves, Estimates, Paybills, etc.

I was then employed relieving Engineers in the North Western District, at Manchester, Blackburn, Bolton, Huddersfield and Penrith, gaining experience in Internal and External work.
